The GOAL for December is to create a sense of belonging and community in your classroom or group and to celebrate the joy of sharing with others



December is the month of celebrations . . . long awaited by young and old alike. The best gifts are healthy relationships with family, friends and co-workers. As the Holiday season arrives, relax and enjoy the time you spend together. Take the pressure off yourself, and think less about shopping this season and more about of relational gifts. Relationships are the building blocks of life — both spiritually and between people. Thomas Fuller said,

"Tis the people, not the houses that make the city."

At this time of year, we might say, "tis the people not the presents that are the gifts." It is the quality of our relationships that most often guide our daily outlook.

Bring up this point with your students. Discuss how relationships are both our weaknesses and our power. What is said and done in relationships can be kind, supportive, encouraging and hopeful. They can also be critical, negative, and hurtful.

Use this month's theme to focus class discussions on relationships and how they affect our daily lives. If you're comfortable, share with students some insights about how they affect you. As a teacher in the classroom, what makes you hopeful, caring and happy? What makes you feel discouraged, negative and disappointed?

CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES

There are many ways to emphasize the Caring Habit to "CELEBRATE" in your classroom or group. The following materials are full of ideas you can use, and ideas that will inspire your own creativity. Take advantage of all the great discussion topics and activities this month. Have a fun day, every day of this month!

Classroom Quilt

Activity: Celebrating our class as a community

by creating a classroom "quilt"

For: A classroom or group

You need: 30-35 squares of paper measuring $8\frac{1}{2}$ x $8\frac{1}{2}$,

a large sheet of cardboard or poster board, nontoxic glue or glue stick, crayons, markers, paints, colored paper, fabric scraps, glitter, and anything

else you can think of. (Photos optional)

Here is how to make your classroom quilt:

- 1. Each square of your quilt will depict a picture about each student. Have everyone sign their square upon completion.
- 2. Use a glue stick to attach the squares to the cardboard or poster board. If you can, have your quilt laminated and displayed in a special place so everyone can enjoy it.
- 3. Then display the finished product in the classroom for open house or Parent / Teacher night. Parents and other visitors will love it!

Community Geography

Activity: Finding home, neighborhood, school and

community on a map. (This activity also provides a good opportunity to learn how to use a map!)

For: Classrooms and individual students

You will need: Local maps, pencils or pens, 30 minutes

Pass out maps. Now discuss the meaning of **Community**. What does the word community mean to each student? Discuss what makes a community. Now use the maps to find each student's street and neighborhood. Locate the home of your best friend or your grandparents. Locate the grocery store, the post office, the bank, your place of worship or other favorite place in town.

We are citizens of our families, our schools and our communities, as well as of our country, the United States of America. Sometimes students forget that citizenship starts at home and in the classroom. Discuss what good citizenship means to each student.

Later in the month, you may want to discuss family and upcoming activities connected with the holidays. You can use the maps again, to look up the towns and streets of students' friends and relatives.

How important is it to live nearby someone to feel close to them?

Time of Day Game

Activity: Learning more about each other

For: A classroom or family

You need: 15 to 20 minutes

Take a few extra minutes and choose someone to start. They name a time of day today and someone else's name. That person has to tell what they were doing at that time. Then they name another time of day and another person in the room. They answer what they were doing, and then give another time and choose another person until everyone has had a turn.

Classroom/Family Coat of Arms

Activity: Designing a classroom / family "coat of arms"

For: A classroom, family or group

You will need: Paper, pen or pencil, crayons, markers

and / or paints, assorted trimmings, scissors,

ruler, your time, and your imagination

Discuss the idea of family and perhaps the history of family coat of arms.

Begin by explaining to your students that a coat of arms is a special and unique picture that defines a family or family-like group. Most dictionaries and encyclopedias will show a sample coat of arms.

Discuss with your students some of the characteristics of your classroom. They are smart, creative, they have a sense of humor, etc. How would you create a coat of arms to define your classroom? Pass out supplies listed above and have the class begin their design. When the coat of arms is finished, display it proudly in the classroom. Invite other classes to participate and hold a competition for the best.

Joyfulness Through Music

Activity: Involve music to increase our sense of JOY

For: A classroom, and individual students

You will need: December Music List from this Idea Book

Go over the list of popular songs about community, family and friendship. Have everyone pick one or two of the most joyful songs they know and sing, hum or whistle all the way home from school. For a more involved exercise, have the students write their own lyrics for a song or a rap.

Locate and play one of the songs from the list of popular music that you think your class would appreciate and relate to. (If available, share the record, cassette, or compact disc player, and picture book of the same title.)

Ask students to brainstorm things they celebrate. On chart paper, convert the brainstorming suggestions into new lyrics and sing the students' version. Have students find a partner. Have each pair illustrate a different line from the new song. Bind the illustrations into a class music book.

The Strength of Cooperation

Activity: Learning more about each other

and the power of TEAMWORK

For: A classroom, group, family and children of all ages

You will need: 15 to 20 minutes and two straws or toothpicks for

every participant

Give each person one straw or one toothpick, whichever is most convenient for you to find. Ask each student if they think they can break the straw or toothpick. Then ask them to break them. Were they easy to break?

Now pass out another straw or toothpick to each person. Then ask two people to each collect all the straws or toothpicks from half the class. Take the bundles and put a string or rubber band around them. Then pass the bundles around the class and ask the students to try to break them.

What is the difference between trying to break one toothpick or a bundle of toothpicks?


How is a bundle of toothpicks like teamwork and cooperation?

FRIENDSHIP - Classroom Discussion

Activity: Discovering the nature of friendship

For: Classrooms or groups

You will need: 15 to 30 minutes

Below are some quotations about FRIENDSHIP that can be used in a discussion about the nature of friendship. There are more in the Quotes Section of this Idea Book. Ask a different student to read each quote and discuss them one at a time.

- A friend is a present you give to yourself.
- Many people will walk in and out of your life, but only true friends will leave footprints in your heart.
- To handle yourself, use your head, to handle others, use your heart.
- He who loses money, loses much; He who loses a friend, loses more; He who loses faith, loses all.
- The beauty of young people are acts of nature, but beautiful old people are works of art.
- Learn from the mistakes of others. You can't live long enough to make them all yourself.
- The tongue weighs practically nothing, but so few people can hold it.
- ♥ Friends, you and me . . . you brought another friend . . . and then there were 3 . . . we started our group . . . Our circle of friends . . . and like that circle . . . there is no beginning . . . there is no end.

"Bright Spot" Sharing & Classroom Discussion

Activity: Discovering what makes people happy


For: A classroom or group

You will need: 15 minutes

Take some class time to discover what it is that makes us happy. Go around the room and have each student briefly describe some "bright spot" in their day. Perhaps a compliment or encouraging word from a parent or teacher, an accomplishment or time with a friend.

Point out how real happiness usually involves other people more than material goods –like getting something new. Discuss the concept of community, and family, and friends. What do people do for one another? What does it mean to support one another?

Ask students to estimate about how many people they have interacted with today? Each one of us interacts in some way with an average of 20 people each day. Everyone is important because they affect the lives of others.



Discussion Topic: Citizenship Rights and Responsibilities

Discuss the difference between RIGHTS and RESPONSIBILITIES. Ask the students to list all of the things they think Citizenship of the United States of America entitles them to. Make a list together of these Rights of Citizenship.

Now ask them to make a list of the Responsibilities of Citizenship. What do we need to do to earn the right of citizenship?*

*Did you know that people in jail lose many of their rights of citizenship?

CLASSROOM DISCUSSION TOPICS

Purpose: To understand and discuss important

relationship topics

For: A classroom or group

You will need: 15 to 30 minutes for any discussion subject chosen,

and card stock paper

Activity 1

To understand RANDOM ACTS OF KINDNESS

Discuss the meaning of **Random Acts of Kindness**. Have the students heard about it? What does it mean to them? Give examples you've witnessed in the classroom where students were kind and supportive of one another or of you.

Each day, have students make a list and write short descriptions of random acts of kindness they have performed. Use stickers to reward their actions.



To understand THANKFULNESS

Discuss thankfulness and what **Thanksgiving** meant to them this year. Remind them that it is healthy to think about the good things in their lives rather than dwell on the bad things. We all have some of both. Have the students list things they are thankful for.



To understand FAMILY

This is a discussion for the classroom, and also one that you can suggest students have at home with their families. The **Family** is a place to learn how to get along in life. It is where values are first established and acted upon. It is where children see examples of good behavior and hopefully learn from these good examples. List the values that are established in the families of students.



To understand LOVE

If you are going to have a discussion about **Love**, you will first have to calm down the snickers and nervousness that most early teens express when the subject of love is brought up. Take this opportunity to explain that love is an important aspect of many types of relationships —not just the romantic kind. Ask your students what love means to them. What other kinds of love are there besides romantic love? Have each student name:

- · three people they love,
- three things they love and
- three places they love.

CLASSROOM DISCUSSIONS (CONT.)

Activity 5

To understand the importance of LOYALTY

Being **Loyal** to someone is a sign that you really care about them. When you are loyal to a person, you try not to do anything to hurt them. YOU WILL NOT lie to them, cheat on them, talk about them behind their back, or betray their trust. Discuss situations where students were betrayed by disloyal friends or relatives and how they felt.

"When you find a friend, loyal, kind and true, Don't trade the old one for a new."

"Always be faithful and loyal, whether to your country or a friend. There may come a time you need one or the other . . . On that you can depend."

"Peace on Earth, Goodwill to Men" - Another Great Classroom Discussion

Activity: Understanding our power for peace

For: A classroom or group

You will need: 15 to 30 minutes, and card stock paper

Discuss the idea behind why we have "Ambassadors" who represent the United States in other countries. Relate that idea to the fact that we are each an "ambassador" who represents what we stand for and that we each have power and influence over others too.

What do we represent with our actions in daily life?

Are we good ambassadors, representing good behavior and good character for our families and our school?

What would a Good-will Ambassador do?

What would a Bad-will Ambassador do?

Give everyone a card to make a sign for their desks with their own name and the words, "Goodwill Ambassador."

Activity: Inspiring students through others' wit and wisdom

For: Teacher, students or group

You will need: Large jar, basket, colorful bag or box, and paper in

the Caring Color of the month (See your Teacher

In-Service manual for a list of papers.)

Use the quotes provided in the Quotations section of this Idea Book and photocopy onto paper in the color of the month. Cut each quote out and fold into a small square. Place in your container and display in a prominent spot for the month.

IDEA ONE

Take one quote out and read aloud each morning of the month.

Discuss the meaning of the quote and reflect on it throughout the day.

IDEA TWO

Have each student take a paper from the container.

Have them write a paragraph or two on their interpretation of the quote.

IDEA ONE



IDEA TWO - On going

Add on to the chain above with next month's color. At the end of the school year, you will have a Caring Habit chain in all the Caring Colors. Explain how the chain began as one loop and now the loop is long enough to go across the room. Read each link and review each monthly theme and color as you go through the chain.

For: A classroom, group, family and children of all ages

You will need: 15 minutes, paper, markers, pencils, etc.

Before starting this cooperative group activity, ask students to brain-storm synonyms for positive character traits such as kindness or cooperation. Chart the synonyms. Look at the Character Education Words-2-Learn included in this IDEA BOOK when preparing a list.

Tell students to demonstrate these words as they work with their group. Just before ending group work, ask students to choose a word from the list and use it in a sentence describing one of his or her group members.

Activity: Encouraging caring attitudes about life


For: A classroom, group, family and children of all ages

You will need: 15 minutes and some paper

Invite students to share special times they enjoy with their families. Suggest that everyone has good times and bad times. Explain that some people focus on good memories while others focus on the bad. Tell the class you want to have a year during which everyone focuses on caring experiences.

Invite each student to draw a picture of a caring memory or celebration (s)he has from the last several weeks. Have students briefly explain the memory in writing at the bottom of the picture.



December is a great month to encourage the renewal of caring and compassion, and to focus on words that express these sentiments. In December, more than at any other time of year, your students are surrounded by good messages about people doing good things. Take advantage of this.

Encourage students to think about the Holidays and the meaning behind the tradition of giving gifts. Discuss the character words for December as a group. Bring the sense of these words alive by discussing actual experiences with your students. Are these character words about material gifts or are they more personal? We can make gifts of our time or ourselves.



An Adrenturous TRup to the MOCN!

We have good reason to celebrate -we are actually on our way.


This trip to the moon is really something we can celebrate with our community, family and friends. It's almost as good as a Holiday. We are in our rocket and looking out the window. We can see everyone down on earth cheering us on, and wishing us a safe trip.

For the first few miles we will pass through the Troposphere. This is the lowest region of the atmosphere between the earth's surface and the tropopause. As we gain altitude the temperature is actually decreasing. The higher we go, the colder it gets.

The troposphere, where air is in constant motion, extends from the earth's surface to an altitude of 5 miles at the poles and 10 miles at the equator. Clouds and other weather phenomena occur here. The jet stream, a high-speed wind near the troposphere, generally moves from the westerly direction at speeds often higher than 250 miles per hour. All forms of the earth's animal and plant life exist in the troposphere or in the waters beneath it. Above the troposphere is the tropopause we will learn more about that atmospheric layer next month.

Well, we are 5 miles up, and the moon is 240,000 miles away. We still have quite a ways to go. We will be picking up speed, and heading for the next phase of the atmosphere.






