



The books listed below are good summer reads with a "become involved" theme too. Read one or read them all.

YOUNG ADULTS - Grades 4-8

The Blossoms Meet the Vulture Lady by Betsy Byars, Bantam Doubleday Dell Books for Young Readers, 1987. The irrepressible Blossom family is back in another unforgettable adventure that could only happen to them. Junior accidentally catches himself in his own coyote trap and is rescued by a woman the kids call "Mad Mary".

Come Back, Salmon: How a Group of Dedicated Kids Adopted Pigeon Creek and Brought It Back To Life by Mollie Cone, Photographs by Sidnee Wheelwright Sierra Club Books for Children, 1992. This true story describes how the children of Jackson Elementary School in Everett, Washington took on and successfully completed the challenge to clean-up a nearby stream, stocking it with salmon and preserving a place where salmon could return to spawn.

The Disappearing Staircase Mystery *created by Gertrude Chandler Warner, illustrated by Hodges Soileau A. Whitman, 200, Series: The Boxcar Children.* In this addition to the popular series, the Alden children volunteer to help fix up an old house for some senior citizens.

PRIMARY READERS - Grades K-3

The Babe and I by David A. Adler, Harcourt Brace, 1999. Set in 1932 during the Great Depression, a young boy gets a dime instead of a bicycle for his birthday and learns his father is selling apples on the street. A fan of the great Babe Ruth, the boy begins selling papers outside Yankee Stadium, shouting the latest exploits of the Yankee star. Then the Babe himself buys one of his papers, making the boy aware of his own part in his family team.

Chicken Soup for Little Souls: The Braid Girl by Lisa McCourt, Health Communications, 1998. When Izzy goes with her grandmother to help at a shelter for the homeless, Izzy notices Susan, a girl about her own age, with ragged-looking braids. Izzy tries to help her with toys, food and clothes, but is hesitant to become friends, fearing she will be thought to be one of the shelter's residents. When Susan uses the colorful laces of her new shoes to make a gift for Izzy, and both girls learn a lesson in friendship and helping.


Contact your local "Meals-on-Wheels" organization and volunteer to bake cookies or make favors for their meal recipients. You could also volunteer with a local soup kitchen.




Walk down the street today and think positive thoughts about your neighbors. Is there a neighbor that needs your help?

YOUNG ADULTS Grades 4-8

The Summer of Mrs. MacGregor by Betty Ren Wright, Holiday House, 1986. When Caroline's much admired older sister is stricken with a serious illness, her mother pays Caroline little attention. In her loneliness, Caroline meets the glamorous and mysterious "Mrs. MacGregor" who is visiting for the summer. Caroline quickly suspects that her new friend is not to be trusted in this fast-moving story.

Where Have All the Flowers Gone? The Diary of Molly Mackenzie Flaherty by Ellen Emerson White, Scholastic, 2002, Series: Dear America. Set in Boston during 1968 with a background detailing the deaths of Robert Kennedy and Martin Luther King, Jr., hippies, the civil rights and women's movements, this companion to The Journal of Patrick Seamus Flaherty, finds Patrick's teenage sister facing some hard choices. Molly has mixed feelings about the war in Vietnam, but is afraid this may be a betrayal of her brother. Volunteering at a VA Hospital against her parents wishes, Molly sees first-hand what could happen to her brother.

The Year Mom Won the Pennant by Matt Christopher, Little, Brown, 1968. When all the fathers of the boys on the team are unable to volunteer to be the coach, one of the mothers steps forward with surprising results.

OLDER READERS, YOUNG ADULTS & ADULTS

Increasing Neighborhood Service: Opportunities to Volunteer *by Bernard Ryan, Ferguson Publishing Co., 1998.* This is an introduction to many different kinds of community service from animal care to health care to literacy with information about the demands and rewards of the work.

One Nation: America Remembers September 11 Little, Brown, 2001. Introduced by New York mayor Guiliani, this is a collection powerful and moving photographs Life magazine's editors have chosen to chronicle the events of the September 11 terrorist attacks and the aftermath, including stories of the survivors and family members of those who were lost.

ALL READERS

Join the Golden Rule Revolution* by Elaine Parke; Illustrated by Darlene Patrick, Caring Media International, 2001. More nourishing than chicken soup. This book is a refreshing year-round recipe of heart warming daily inspirations, poems and action tips —all organized into lively monthly themes— that transform Golden Rule Habits into happiness. See Chapter 7 – July - Become Involved for daily teacher / classroom / family reading. *WARNING! This book is habit-forming. *May cause a happier life.





Filled with facts and beautiful artwork as well as a sensitive story of an endangered creature, the book also provides a list of Wildlife Agencies along the east coast.

Volunteering by Amanda Rondeau, ABDO Publications, 2003, Series: United We Stand This is a brief introduction for young readers to different ways volunteers can help make a difference for other people.



Mitzvah Magic: What Kids Can Do to Change the World

by Danny Siegel, Kar-Ben Pub., 2002. Mitzvah means "commandment" in Hebrew, but traditionally refers to an act of kindness. This book is packed with inspiring and personal stories that show young people how to make a difference in the world.

Starring Rosie by Patricia Reilly Giff, Puffin, 1998, Series: Ballet Slippers. When her ballet class decides to perform the "Sleeping Beauty", Rosie volunteers to provide both the prince and the props for the production.



Doctors Without Borders by Anastasia Suen, PowerKids Press, 2002, Series: Helping Organizations: Reading Power. Another in the excellent series about American-based organizations that help others throughout the world, the book describes the work of volunteer medical personnel who offer help in time of disaster and need. Habitat for Humanity and The Peace Corps are two others in this series.

Gracie's Girl by Ellen Wittlinger, Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 2000. Sixth-grader Bess wants to change her image as a "dork" and fit in and become popular at her new middle school. She joins the drama club and volunteers to help with the school musical. When she and her friend Ethan discover Gracie, a homeless old woman raiding dumpsters for food, she has to make choices about what things are really important.

Harriet the Spy by Louise Fitzhugh, Delacorte Press, 2000. As much fun as it was when it was originally published in 1964, Harriet is the neighborhood "spy". With her trusty notebook and powers of observation and not-so-perfect parents, Harriet is headed for trouble. For more of Harriet's adventures The Long Secret continues the story.

PRIMARY READERS - Grades K-3

Cyrus the Unsinkable Sea Serpent by Bill Peet, Houghton Mifflin, 1975. Filled with humor, Cyrus the shy and gently sea-serpent has always wanted to be a hero, but his size and appearance are frightening. A storm at sea, a ship in trouble and some nasty pirates give Cyrus the chance to prove his true nature and be a hero.

Edwina the Emu by Sheena Knowles and Rod Clement, HarperCollins, 1997. When emus, Edwina and Edward, discover they are expecting 10 little ones. Edwina decides to look for a job outside their zoo home. Of all the many different things she tries, nothing is quite right. A funny, rhyming tale that children will laugh at and remember.

Helping Hands: How Families Can Reach Out to Their Community by Richard Mintzer, Chelsea House, 2003,

Series: Focus on Family Matters Using real-life examples, this book shows how young people and their families can make a difference by volunteering to help others in times of tragedies or to improve their communities.

How Can You Help?: Creative Volunteer Projects for Kids Who Care

by Linda Schwartz, Learning Works, 1994. This illustrated book is filled with more than 100 volunteer projects for pre-teens.

In Good Hands: Behind the Scenes at a Center for Orphaned and Injured Birds

by Stephen R. Swinburne, Sierra Club Books for Children, 1998. At the Vermont Raptor Center orphaned and injured birds of prey ranging from eagles to owls are returned to health and, when possible, released into the wild. Sixteen-year-old Hannah gives a behindthe-scenes look at the workings of the Center, including some of the not-so-happy endings.

Kids Volunteering Book by Arlene Erlbach, Lerner Publications, 1998. A wide variety of twelve volunteer opportunities for young people are shown in this well-organized book that profiles some of the youngsters that volunteer. Both local and national examples are used, from clowning to landscaping.
